Someone from Dr. Solomon's office will call you one to two days before your surgery to give you instructions and tell you when you should check in on the day of surgery.

Preparing for Your Cataract Procedure

Beginning 3 Days Before Your Surgery

Eye Drops

To help prepare your eye for surgery, you will receive a prescription for eye drops:

· Zymar (Gatifloxacin) · Acuvail (Ketorolac) · Durezol (Difluprednate)

These drops will help prevent infection and aid in the healing process.

Use the Zymar drops as follows:

- · 1 drop in the eye that will have surgery.
- · Repeat 4 times a day at 4-hour intervals. Example: 8 am, 12 pm, 4 pm, 8 pm.

Use the Acuvail drops as follows:

- · 1 drop in the eye that will have surgery.
- · Repeat 2 times a day. Example: 8 am, 8 pm.

When using both drops at the same time, wait 5 minutes between drops.

Cleaning Your Eye

During these 3 days, use eyelid scrubs 2 times a day (morning and night) on the eye that will have surgery. This will help to prevent infection. You can buy eyelid scrubs at any drugstore, or you may use a warm cloth with baby shampoo instead.

The Night Before Your Surgery

To help prevent nausea and vomiting DO NOT eat or drink anything after midnight the night before your surgery.

On the Morning of Surgery Only

Beginning 1 hour before you are scheduled to check in at the surgery center:

- · Place one drop of Durezol in your eye.
- Repeat every 15 minutes until surgery Example: If your scheduled check-in time is 8:00 am, place one drop of Durezol in your eye at 7 am, 7:15 am, 7:30 am, and 7:45 am.

Pre-Surgery Checklist				
	Use Durezol drops as directed			
	Take morning medications (only if instructed to do so).			
	Wear loose-fitting, short-sleeved clothing.			
	DO NOT wear jewelry, nail polish, or makeup.			
	DO NOT bring any money or valuables with you.			
	Bring all medications you are currently taking.			
	Bring your medical insurance ID cards with you.			
	Make sure an adult driver is available to take you home following surgery and will be available for the next 24 hours.			
	Check in at Physicians Eye Surgery Center at your scheduled time.			

During Your Cataract Procedure

Most cataract surgery is performed under topical or local anesthesia and numbing eye drops.

Although you may feel slight pressure during surgery, you should not experience any discomfort or pain.

If you feel any pain or become nauseated during surgery, let the physician or nurse know so they can make you more comfortable.

Following surgery, you will spend a short period of time in the recovery area. We will schedule an appointment for your one-day post-operative check-up before you return home to resume your normal daily activities.

What to Expect After Your Surgery

If you experience discomfort for a few days following surgery, you may take Tylenol for relief. If you are allergic to Tylenol, please take what you would normally take for a headache.

Your vision may be slightly blurred for a few days (up to a week) following surgery, as your eye recovers.

Your eye may appear slightly red; this will gradually clear during the first few days after surgery.

You may also notice that your pupil (the black part of your eye) is smaller than the pupil of the other eye. This is normal. The pupil will slowly return to its normal size within two days after surgery.

Call Carolina Eye Physicians immediately if you experience any of these symptoms after your surgery:

- · sudden decrease in vision
- · severe eye pain
- · increased redness of the eye
- · increased discharge from the eye
- persistent pain that is not relieved by Tylenol

General Post-Operative Instructions

Properly caring for your eyes after your surgery is important in the healing process, so keep the following precautions in mind:

	Do This	Avoid This

		more than 20 pounds Swimming for 2 weeks or scuba diving for 1 month after the procedure

Eye Drops

Take the following eye drops as directed after surgery:

Time Period	Eye Drop Directions
The first 14 days following surgery	Use the Zymar drops as follows: • 1 drop in the eye that had surgery. • Repeat 4 times a day at 4-hour intervals.
	Use the Durezol drops as follows: • 1 drop in the eye that had surgery. • Repeat 4 times a day at 4-hour intervals.
	Use the Acuvail drops as follows: · 1 drop in the eye that had surgery. · Repeat 2 times a day.
	When using more than one kind of drop at the same time, wait 5 minutes between drops.
After the first	Stop using Zymar.
14 days following surgery	Continue using Acuvail as follows: · 1 drop in the eye that had surgery. · Repeat 2 times a day.
	Continue using Durezol, but decrease how often you use it: · 1 drop in the eye that had surgery. · Repeat only 2 times a day.
	When using more than one kind of drop at the same time, wait 5 minutes between drops.

Post-Operative Appointment

You will be asked to come to the office the day after surgery for a short follow-up visit.

Approximately 2 to 4 weeks after your surgery, we will check your glasses and dilate your eyes, so please arrange to have another adult available to drive you home.


- Take I-26 (toward Savannah) to I-526 (toward Savannah)
